Located in historic Irvington, Virginia, where the Rappahannock River meets the Chesapeake Bay, Chesapeake Academy is a PreK 3&4 - Grade 8 school dedicated to preparing each student for future academic, ethical, social, and physical endeavors in an intellectually challenging environment.

Bound by common goals and aspirations, Chesapeake Academy students experience an academically challenging, traditional liberal arts curriculum taught by teachers who model creativity, commitment, flexibility, teamwork, and a love of learning. Intellectual curiosity is valued, laying the foundation for a lifetime of learning, growth, and achievement. Our caring and supportive environment guides children to develop confidence in their abilities. In all aspects of school life, teachers know their students well.

This relationship allows teachers to address differences in learning styles and teach in ways children will experience their greatest achievement. In keeping with our heritage, Chesapeake Academy students are an interconnected community of learners. Our school, guided by a purposeful social and ethical curriculum, is a place where friendships and consideration for others thrive and responsibility and leadership develop. We embrace each other's beliefs and differences and discover that our diversity enriches us.

The school's community, formed by a unique partnership of parents, students, teachers, alumni and neighbors, works together to help children achieve academic excellence and personal growth. We believe students learn best when teachers, parents, and children work in harmony.



From PreK 3&4 through Eighth Grade, Chesapeake Academy students develop and articulate ideas. The inclusion of visual and performing arts in the curriculum encourages self-discovery and creative expression. The physical education and athletic programs promote lifelong personal fitness and character development.

School-wide experiences and community service opportunities encourage students to be comfortable expressing their ideas in front of others as well as assuming future leadership roles. Chesapeake Academy believes that an enriched and challenging academic curriculum, within a nurturing, child-centered environment, provides the foundation for future.

On September 18th, 1889, the first classes of Chesapeake Academy were held. It was then known as the Chesapeake Male and Female Academy. Eighteen years later the last commencement exercises of the old Academy were held. During those 18 years, approximately 450 students were educated at the Academy, from Irvington, Kilmarnock, Weems, Ocran, White Stone, and four surrounding counties. By May of 1890 through 1907, before the first session ended, the “study and recreation” building, known as Academy Hall (now The Hope & Glory Inn) was completed. The Academy’s courses extended from the preparatory department of reading, writing, spelling, geography, arithmetic, elementary English and primary U.S. history, to preparation for entry into the “senior classes” of any first rate college.

During the summer of 1965, as an alternative to public education, three families decided to re-establish the Chesapeake Academy. The Rowe Family of Irvington donated the property and main buildings. The faculty numbered only seven, with grades 3 and above being taught by the entire faculty. Class size was limited to 15. By 1969 the Lower School building was dedicated, and a gym with four classrooms was opened in the fall of 1973.

Despite some financial struggles, the students continued to excel, with approximately 75% of the graduates attending prep schools. Parents, trustees and the community were convinced of the value of an independent school in the region. The Academy became a member of the Virginia Association of Independent Schools in 1991. In 1997, the Board initiated a capital campaign to raise the necessary funds for much needed classrooms and renovations. The campaign successfully raised \$1,000,000 for these improvements to the school’s facilities.

Today, with an enrollment of 144 students in Preschool through 8th grade from 19 communities and five counties, 27 faculty and staff, a 33 ½ -acre campus, 800 alumni, a \$950,000 endowment, transportation services, an active State-licensed Extended Day program, Chesapeake Academy looks to the future with anticipation and justifiable confidence.

Teachers make full use of our beautiful campus, Nature Trail, Outdoor Classroom, the surrounding town of Irvington, and beyond to provide our students with authentic and meaningful experiences.



Strengths of the School

The next Head of School will benefit from CA's many strengths, including:

- Outstanding leadership from previous Heads of School working in concert with the Board of Trustees. Their close working relationship underpins the strong sense of family and community.
- Committed, energetic, and creative faculty who model lifelong learning.
- Commitment to providing a safe environment in which students can learn, take risks, and develop into lifelong learners.
- The school is guided by a long-standing philosophy statement and an updated mission statement (2017), resulting in a high degree of alignment and consistent implementation across all programs and operations.
- Faculty and staff have committed themselves to differentiated instruction and have worked to implement significant changes across the curriculum and at all grade levels.
- A curricular commitment to global awareness, pluralism and 21st century skills.
- A strong sense of community and genuine love for the school that reaches beyond the classroom and into the hearts and minds of the community at large without a direct connection to this unique place.
- Continuity of leadership of the school and enthusiastic faculty with a low turnover.

Situated along the banks of Carter’s Creek in Virginia’s historic “Northern Neck,” Irvington is a delightful small town located about 70 miles east of the state capital in Richmond. A quintessential coastal village, the town is home to two nationally recognized inns and, along with the neighboring towns of Kilmarnock and White Stone, the area has much to offer: boating, fishing, golf, shopping, antiques, museums, outdoor festivals and concerts, farmer’s markets, a wide variety of dining, wineries, parks and nature trails, and a new family entertainment complex boasting six first-run movie screens, miniature golf, a climbing wall and ropes course, and more.

The Northern Neck peninsula—bounded by the Potomac River to the north, the Rappahannock River to the south, and the majestic Chesapeake Bay to the east—is the “birthplace of our nation” with three of the first five American presidents being born here, and the home of other prominent families that helped form our nation and signed the Declaration of Independence. In addition to its many historic sites, it’s a land where generational watermen continue to harvest rockfish, blue crabs, and the famous Virginia oyster, and where family farms still flourish to this day.

Chesapeake Academy has developed a cohesive school community and published a comprehensive curriculum.
